

Mock Revisions: Study Smart, Succeed Confidently

Tip 1 - Create a study schedule. Planning time for revision is vital in making sure you give enough time to each of your subjects. Make sure you choose a variety of subjects to revise for each day. ex. 1 hr Mathematics, 1 hr English, 1 hr Science, 1 hr History, 1 hr Music - with enough breaks in between.

Tip 2 - As much as you want to get everything done, it is vital to take some breaks in between your work. Your brain and body need a break between intense periods of concentration, don't tire yourself out! Give yourself small rewards like chocolate or sip of juice between each revision session.






