

Top Tips - Hear From Our Staff Experts

Since we recently celebrated World Book Day, it's the perfect time for **Ms. Riley** Year 3 Teacher to share her top reading tips. Her insights will not only inspire a love of reading in your children but also support their literacy development.

- **Tip 1 Choosing books that spark curiosity is essential**—we all need to be excited about the books we are reading. If you are not sure what to choose, ask for recommendations and be proactive, the right books are there waiting for you!
- **Tip 2 Children need to see reading as a treat from a young age.** When we approach reading with enthusiasm, it creates a positive mindset, making us more eager to read. This looks different for everyone; my reading treat is getting to settle into a cosy chair for a few hours with a blanket and a cup of tea!
- **Tip 3 Read with your child!** Whether you're listening to them read aloud when they are in primary school or starting a family book club when they are in secondary school, your involvement is crucial. English National Opera's production of Mozart's 'Marriage of Figaro' at the London Coliseum.

On Monday 3rd February, the music department took GCSE Music students from Y9, 10 and 11 to see the dress rehearsal of English National Opera's production of Mozart's 'Marriage of Figaro' at the London Coliseum.

Here is what **Rinko**, **Y9 GCSE Music student** had to say about the experience:

The trip to Mozart's The Marriage of Figaro, brought to the stage by ENO, was fascinating enough to counter almost any previous misconceptions about operas. Three-hour monotonous laments of 300-year-old dramas? Dusty fuel for pretentious music critics? Hardly. Set in a single day of madness centring around the conflicts between clashing and colourful characters, the opera displays a brilliantly chaotic plot grounded by some magnificent music by Mozart at his peak.

Contrasting with the comedic, bubbly tones in the first half were some of the most exceptionally deep arias breaking surface in the second, and the whole procession had the perfect balance for a richly engrossing experience. Intriguingly, the set itself consisted only of a white rectangular room with four doors – far from becoming dull, this created the effect of bringing the spotlight to the characters and their interactions with each other.

These four doors served interesting functions, sometimes windows, sometimes secret hide-outs, sometimes deliberately thrown open to show the audience the chaos inside. It goes to show that there is as much mystery to an open door as to a closed one... and that despite false impressions, there is as much glamour to an opera as there is to other forms of entertainment. There is no doubt that this trip has opened the door into a new dimension of music for me.
